





Electric Lines

The ice and snow of this past January may be far from your mind as you anticipate the promise of Spring, but wintry conditions, or any weather-related activity that has the potential to cause outages, are always at the forefront of your cooperative's mind. It is no secret that we cannot control the weather, but your cooperative has taken significant steps to improve reliability where outages caused by icy or windy conditions are concerned.

A large percentage of outages that occur during winter weather are due to tree-related problems. To “cut back” on potential tree-related problems Halifax EMC operates an aggressive right-of-way maintenance program. Our contractors look for foliage growing under lines, overhanging branches, leaning or other types of “danger” trees that could pull down a power line if they fall, and trees that could grow into lines. It's a never-ending job. By the time crews finish trimming activities along our 1,358 miles of distribution lines, vegetation has started to grow back at the starting point.

We realize that at times, right-of-way maintenance can look unsightly, but over time the process of cutting trees and spraying vegetation enables Halifax EMC to keep costs affordable for you, our members. Fewer and shorter outages save money for

everyone. When crews work in well-maintained areas, we can reduce risks for employees and equipment too; another way to keep costs low.

In working to keep a safe, reliable, and affordable supply of power flowing to your home or business, we need your help. Let us know if you notice trees or branches that might pose a risk to our power lines. Even more important, before planting trees in your yard, think about how tall they may grow and how wide their branches may spread. As a rule of thumb, 25 feet of ground-to-sky clearance should be available on each side of our utility poles to give power lines plenty of space. Choose tree varieties with care and plant with power lines in mind.

Lastly, in the event an outage does occur it is also important that we have your correct telephone number and service address. Halifax EMC's outage reporting system recognizes phone numbers and service addresses that are currently on file for each member. If you have a new telephone number, our outage reporting system will not recognize the number and therefore, cannot match the caller to a service location. Like an overgrown right-of-way, having incorrect data slows down power restoration response time. Please update your information with one of our member service representatives.

Understanding energy issues, engaging in democracy creates stronger communities

North Carolina's primary election is Tuesday, March 15, and electric cooperatives, including Halifax EMC, are paying close attention to the candidates' stance on energy issues, as well as other issues that may affect our local communities.

Ahead of the primary, North Carolina's electric cooperatives are asking all presidential candidates a question important to electric cooperatives and their members—what is your plan for providing Americans with safe, reliable and affordable electricity?

Their answers are contained in a special voter guide in this issue of Carolina Country, as well as in an online voter guide found at carolinacountry.com/vote, available for cooperative members as a resource without commentary or conjecture. It is important for members to have facts because members of Halifax EMC are also owners. The cooperative has a board of directors that sets the strategic direction and policies

for Halifax EMC, and members, those who receive electric service from the cooperative, elect representatives to that board.

The information within the voter guide will provide cooperative members with the knowledge necessary not only to make decisions about presidential candidates but also to understand more about how energy issues impact Halifax EMC, its members and the local community. Cooperatives are locally owned and operated, and together, the cooperative and its members can navigate the changing energy industry to determine what's best for the cooperative and local community.
